CRITTERS OF PROSPECT PARK EAST RIVER ROAD Seen Within Last Few Years Informal Survey (December 2010)

More non-human critters are seen around 4th St. and East River Road than elsewhere—they, travel along the railroad tracks and the Mississippi River. Increasing numbers of non-resident humans are regularly seen cluttering our streets with their cars then taking the #16 bus. No one reported species in Bridal Veil Creek.

It would be a good project to write an illustrated booklet of *Prospect Park East River Road Fauna*, and one with recipes of *PPERR Edible Plants* (there are many). It could involve the kids at Pratt. (Some of the mammals are edible as well, but most PPERR folks do not seem to partake.)

There are probably more Frog, Leopard Salamander, Spotted Skink, Five-Lined Snakes Common Garter (*Many other species in Minneapolis*) Toad, American Turtle Painted Soft Shell (spiny or smooth?)

MOLLUSKS & FISH

Slugs (they feast on our Hosta) Snails (terrestrial & aquatic) Not reported, but there are mussels & clams & many species of fish in the river

BIRDS

There must be many more, including water & shore birds by the Mississippi River.
